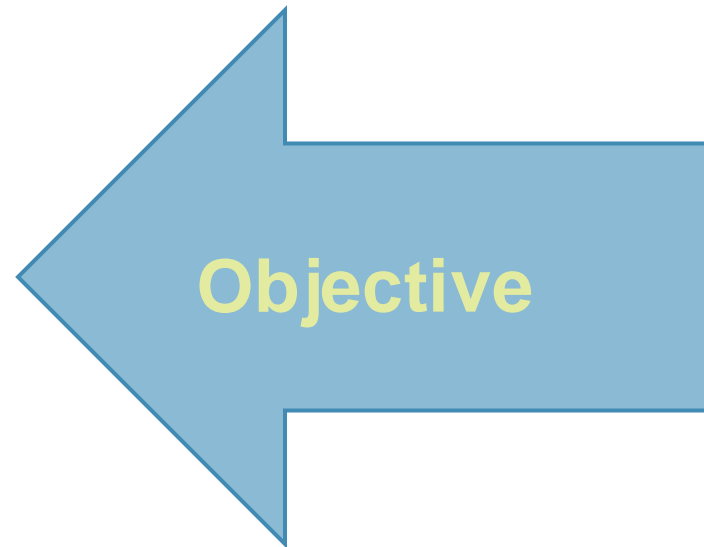
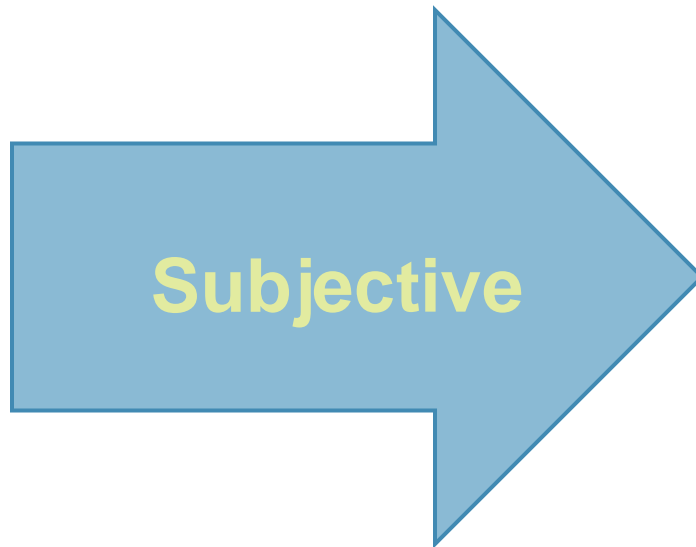

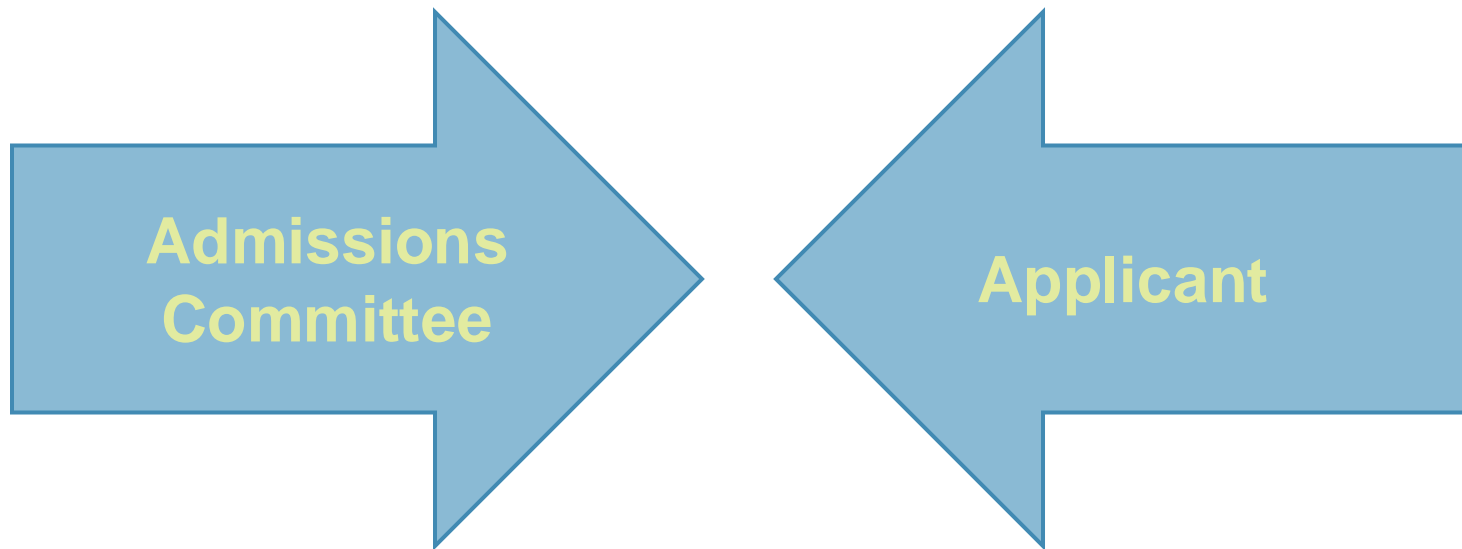

Holistic Review Goes Both Ways...



If health professional programs are going to holistically review you, wouldn't it be advantageous to holistically review them prior to giving them your application?

First, Identify Which Programs Exist...

Note to Pre-PA students: Choosing Your Schools should begin as soon as you identify yourself on a Pre-PA track to ensure your course of study will meet the requirements for your schools of interest, as they vary **greatly from program-to-program.*

SUBJECTIVE: Mission/Values Fit

Identify 2-3 threads that represent the core mission/values of a program, AND tie a line from 2-3 of your experiences that demonstrate alignment with those threads.

How can you identify a program's mission or value threads?



- 1. Program Search Engines**

 - Research or project areas
- 3. Admissions Events**

Mission/Value Examples

Boston University Chobanian & Avedisian School of Medicine: is dedicated to the educational, intellectual, professional, and personal development of a diverse group of exceptional students, trainees, and faculty who are deeply committed to the study and to the practice of medicine, to biomedical research, and to the health of the public. We, as a community, place great value on excellence, integrity, service, social justice, collegiality, equality of opportunity, and interdisciplinary collaboration. Chobanian & Avedisian SOM is a **social justice medical school**. This emphasis on social justice is evident in our curriculum and extra-curricular activities for students, in our faculty's areas of research and expertise, and in the patients we take care of.

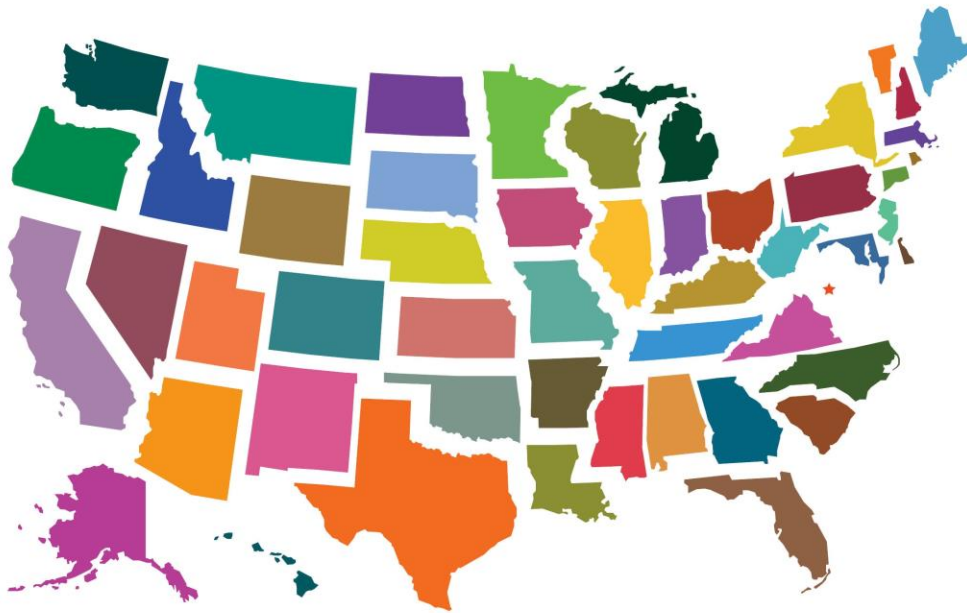
Albert Einstein College of Medicine: is a research-intensive medical school. For more than 60 years, our diverse faculty and staff have set the standard for excellence in medical and graduate education and patient-centered clinical care, and have made major contributions to scientific research enhancing human health in our communities and beyond. Our mission is to prepare a diverse body of students to become knowledgeable, compassionate physicians and innovative scientific investigators, and to create new knowledge.

Mission/Value Examples

Loma Linda: The mission of the School of Medicine is to continue the teaching and healing ministry of Jesus Christ.

Meharry Medical College: Meharry Medical College is a global academic health sciences center advancing health equity through innovative research, transformative education, exceptional and compassionate health services and policy-influencing thought leadership. True to its legacy, Meharry empowers diverse populations to improve the well-being of humankind. In 1876, Meharry Medical College was founded and established as the Meharry Medical Department of Central Tennessee College by the Freedmen's Aid Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Meharry's inception was part of the society's continuing effort to educate freed slaves and to provide health care services for the poor and underserved. Today, the School of Medicine continues to provide excellent educational opportunities to promising students from groups underrepresented in medicine.

SUBJECTIVE: Geographic Location



- **Public schools are funded by the state** and part of their mission is to provide the state with physicians from the state and for the state!
- We recommend **applying to public schools where an applicant has state residency** and **limiting applications at public schools where an applicant does not have residency.**
 - *State residency requirements vary from program to program*
 - *Typically, public schools accept 20-30% out of state applicants*
- Private schools typically accept students from various locations, but having **significant ties to the geographic location always helps!**
- Think broadly about applying to programs serving **specific communities** (urban, suburban, rural, etc.) rather than just the climate.
- ***International students** should also pay special attention to ensure the schools on their list accept international students (most program search engines have a filter for this!)

If your AMCAS legal residence is not one of the WWAMI states (WA, WY, AK, MO, ID) you will be considered as an out-of-region applicant. Out-of-region applications undergo additional screening processes and will only be considered for admission into the MD program if they have an **exceptional** record of **service** and/or come from a **disadvantaged background**.

OBJECTIVE: Academic Record & Entrance Exam



An applicant's academic record and entrance exam are used as evidence to support the applicant's academic readiness for medical education and licensure exams!

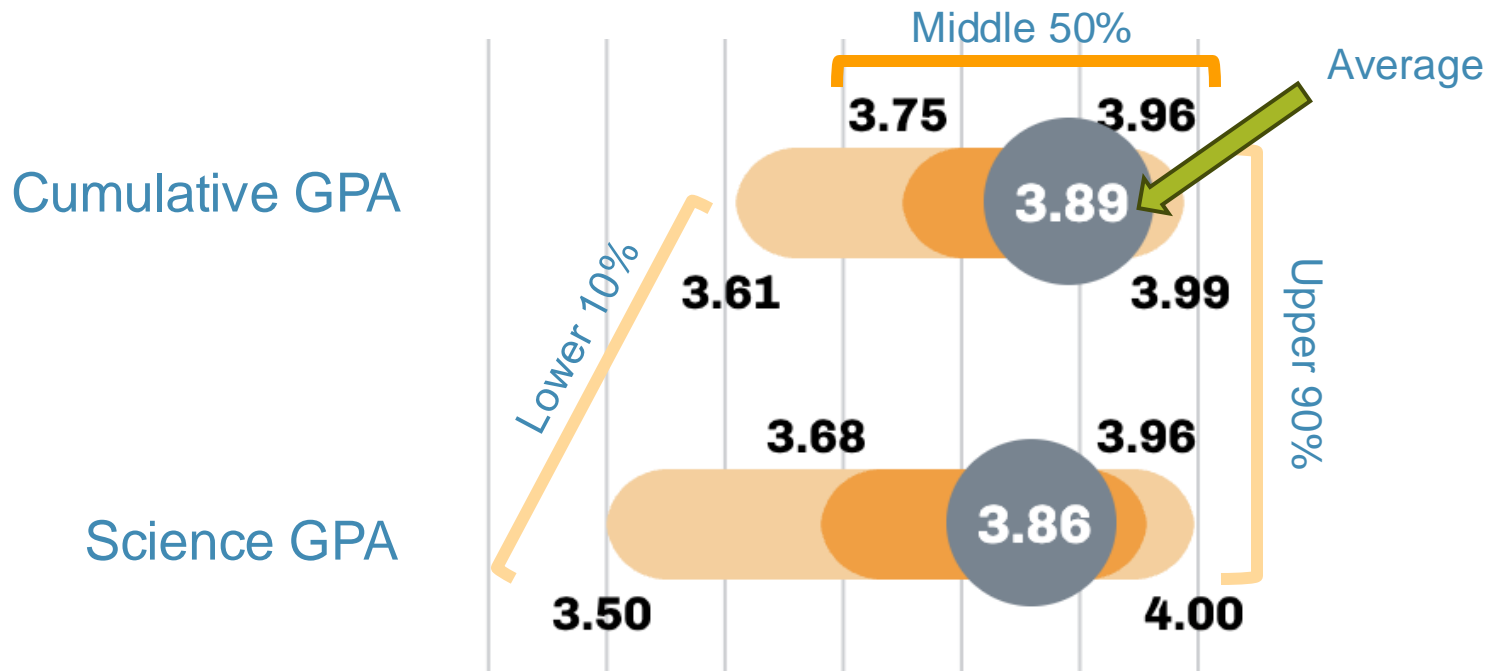


One aspect of the holistic review process, but should not be ignored.

When possible, work off a range of scores (middle 50%). If a range is not available, work off the average.

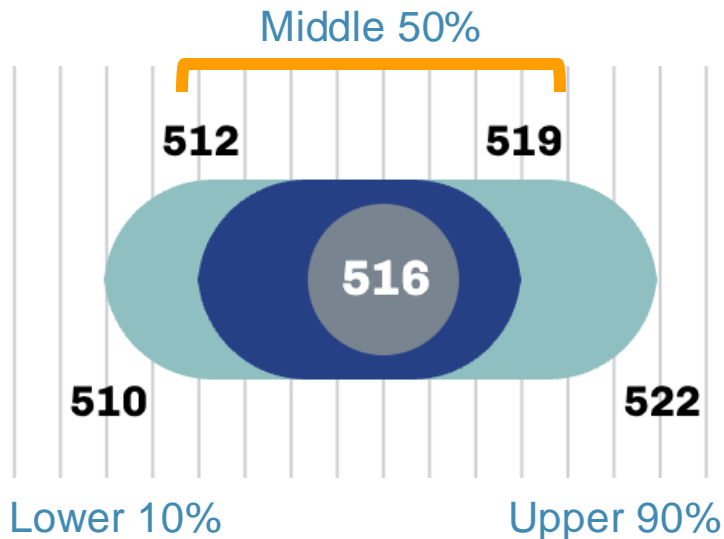

OBJECTIVE: Admission Exam Ranges

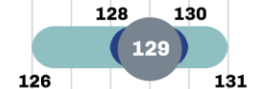
When possible, work off a range of scores (middle 50%). If a range is not available, work off the average.

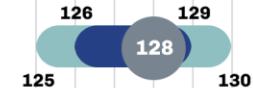

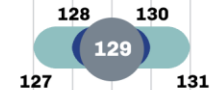
Chemical and Physical

Systems



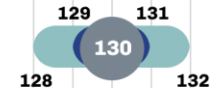
Critical Analysis and

ASSESSMENT: Honest Self-Reflection

Why do you think you'd be happy at this program?

What do you hope to receive from your medical education?

What experiences are central to your career goals?

What is your learning style?

What do you need to support your personal well-being?

What do you picture yourself doing in the future? Where? With whom?

Plan: Develop Your School List

Phase 1: Pre-Entrance Exam Score

- Develop a tentative school list.
- Longer list of schools with strong subjective alignment and a gradient of objective alignment (academics/entrance exam).

Phase 2: Post-Entrance Exam Score

- Finalize your school list, adjust to admissions exam score.
- **15-25 schools** for medical school applicants.
- **8-12 schools** for dental, PA, podiatry, veterinary, & optometry applicants.

Quality of fit is more important than **quantity** of schools one applies to!



Your spreadsheet can (and should) grow and evolve as you receive secondaries & interviews.
